




Figure 1: Percent Change from Previous Year, Enrollment by Sector (Title IV, Degree-Granting Institutions)




CC Enrollment Down Nationwide




Wyoming CC Enrollment




By Wyoming CC (Headcount)




By Full Time Equivalents (FTE)




Enrollment by Residency WY CC's







Enrollment Down Across all Ages




Men Down Slightly More than Women




Closest Down the Mostest




Far Fewer Part-Time Students




AS Degrees are a Bright Spot

Other Considerations

- High School Graduates in the West are projected to Increase (Source: WICHE Knocking at the College Door)
 - Wyoming 6,200 HS Grads per year through 2032 (24.4% Increase)
 - Colorado 58,000 HS Grads per year through 2032 (18.5% Increase)
 - Nebraska 24,000 HS Grads per year through 2032 (11.9% Increase)
- Wyoming's overall population is shrinking, especially in the working adult age groups.
