1. CALL TO ORDER – Board Chairman Wendy Soto

Board Chairman Wendy Soto called to order the October 20, 2021, Board Meeting of the Laramie County Community College District Board of Trustees at 7:09 p.m.

The newest Student Ex Officio Trustee, Ms. Taylor Baxter, gave an introduction.

2. MINUTES – Approval of the September 15, 2021 Board Minutes – Board Chairman Wendy Soto

Trustee Merrell moved and Trustee Lyttle seconded,

3. REPORTS TO THE BOARD

A. Staff Senate – President Linda Herget

Staff Senate hosted their annual crock pot cookoff last week and raised \$378 for the Randy B. Miller Scholarship fund. They will be doing the annual holiday door decorating contest and will have electronic voting set up so all can share their vote monetarily! They are also working with Faculty Senate for the monthly Lunch & Learns.

B. Faculty Senate – President Jennifer DeRouchey

They have their first faculty of the month awardee, Ms. Danielle Opp. They started working with the Wyoming Education Association. One of the representatives have already started to meet with faculty who are currently members. They will have a discussion at their next meeting to discuss how they can be of help as whole on campus. They are also taking a more active role in helping current continuing contract employees and walking them through that process.

C. COVID Update – Jesse Blair, Director of Risk Management and Campus Safety

Currently, LCCC's 7-day trend includes 1 case, with 8 cases in the last 14 days. The COVID-19 Dashboard shows 6 active cases, with 2 on the Cheyenne campus that will fall off as of Friday. There are still a lot of employees who have spouses or children who are quarantined as HR has been handing out a lot of tests. The campus vaccination percentage is 61% as of today, with 127 employees who have not reported vaccination status.

D. RAC Project Updates - Vice President Rick Johnson, Associate Vice President Lisa Trimble

The last report they sent out RFP's for a contractor and architect to be brought on simultaneously. Those bids will be back on Tuesday. Within the next couple of weeks, they will have evaluated, scored, and selected the contractor and architect. They are anticipating to kickoff the project late November/early December. On the lease revenue bond financing side, the packaging of materials is progressing nicely. These materials will be distributed to area banks November 5th and by November 19th, proposals are due back from the banks that are interested in purchasing the bonds. The Board of Trustees and the Building Authority Committee will be approving everything at their December 1st meetings. Documents will be signed on December 14th and closing will be on December 15th.

Today, they have commitments of just over \$400,000. The LCCC Foundation has allocated \$300,000 in an unrestricted gift to be used as dollar per dollar matching funds for individuals that would like to support the project in the \$10,000 to \$75,000 level. They have a prospect list of about 25 to 30 individuals and businesses they are currently trying to meet with and have conversations about the project. Their goal is to secure commitments of \$1 million by the end of December and continue to work on what the remaining fundraising plan would look like after January 1st.

4. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As a reminder, Strategic Plan prioritizations are due to President Schaffer by Friday. Additionally, Governor Gordon will be visiting the College on November 29th from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. President Schaffer will get the agenda drafted and share with the Board of Trustees.

The Wyoming Innovation Partnership (WIP), previously known as the Wyoming Innovation Network, is the partnership with the community colleges and the university at the direction of Governor Gordon. The WIP groups have been coordinating the efforts to come up with the linked proposal of activities and efforts that WIP will endorse. Steve Farkas has been tasked to administer the WIP efforts. The Governor was given authority by the legislature to expend about \$50 million of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for immediate investments. The Governor and his Cabinet have structured the use of ARPA funds in three phases that he's calling Survive, Drive, and Thrive. The money he was given to utilize and appropriate are predominately for the Survive components. The linked proposal, totaling about \$25 million, are the items they've asked the Governor to consider funding, specifically from the \$50 million. A few items included will benefit LCCC such as relocating Impact 307 in Cheyenne, Concept Forge and Fabrication Lab, software development, and a few other things.

As for the Drive and Thrive stages, the Drive stage is intended to use funds to help drive the State to full recovery post-pandemic, and the Thrive stage is using resources to ensure the State thrives into the future. Under the Drive component, there's a variety of higher education entities that have submitted a request that has gone to the Strike Force, who will then make a recommendation to the Governor which then goes to the legislature where they will ultimately determine the appropriation of those funds.

The linked requests above have come from higher education. For ARPA funding, under the Drive component, they anticipate the legislature will consider in their session, based on the Governor's recommendation. The Programmatic Startup Funds has the biggest immediate impact for LCCC. The College's Drive requests are submitted on behalf of the colleges, by the Wyoming Community College Commission (WCCC) for things that would impact the colleges. The WCCC requests are items the commission has requested for their own administration. The Education Attainment Executive Council (EAEC) requests, underneath the Higher Education Attainment effort that Governor Mead launched, have a variety of things that would intersect with higher education, some that will likely be legislation, such as the Wyoming's Tomorrow scholarship.

There's been some confusion about priorities from the community colleges, whether it's the WIP requests, Wyoming Association of Community Colleges (WACCT) agenda items, or the ARPA requests. The priorities remain to be the exception requests that WCCC submitted, on behalf of the colleges.

5. APPROVAL ITEMS

President Schaffer walked through the linked report.

B. ACCT Leadership Congress Report – Board Chairman Wendy Soto, Board Vice Chairman Bob Salazar, Trustee Thompson, Trustee Ketcham, and Trustee Lyttle

Board Chairman Wendy Soto, Board Vice Chairman Bob Salazar, Trustee Thompson, Trustee Ketcham, and Trustee Lyttle all attended the ACCT Leadership Congress in San Diego.

Trustee Lyttle reported she is the representative of two organizations. She's the State Coordinator as well as the voting delegate for LCCC. As the State Coordinator, she heard about the ACCT federal priorities which include ARPA, the Infrastructure Plan which includes the American Jobs Plan and the American Families Plan, and workforce development and job training. Part of the American Families Plan includes tuition free community colleges. Noah Brown, who has been the CEO of ACCT for about 16 years, will be retiring and Jee Hang Lee will be taking over as CEO. They elected new ACCT board members and are now seeing a lot more women of color in the leadership of ACCT. Additionally, she attended workshops regarding digital textbooks, digital marketing, and business incubators.

Trustee Thompson shared there was a construction company that came to an Arizona Community College and asked if they could partner, and within three months they had a two-year program for this construction company. They worked together on the curriculum in order for students to graduate within two years with their Associate's degree. Once they completed, students were offered an incentive of a \$1,000 signing bonus. She wanted to bring forth as something for the College to think about to increase enrollment and community partnerships.

Vice Chairman Bob Salazar attended workshops regarding Student Housing as an Equity Measure, Governing and Leading an Institution Towards Integrated Planning, and Dynamic Partnerships Reimagined regarding mechatronics.

Trustee Ketcham attended a workshop pertaining to Pell Grants to help teach students in prison, starting July 2023, where the institution has to be in the prison to teach but cannot use tables, pens, pencils, etc. due to inmates potentially using those items in a negative way.

Board Chairman Wendy Soto attended a workshop regarding a program called, "Giving Credit Where Credit is Due" where they have an automated degree system. This system performs a degree audit every semester and if a student is eligible for a degree/certificate, they are notified, and the degrees/certificates are automatically awarded. Students are able to opt out if they want to continue their education or if it could potentially affect their financial aid. She also attended the same digital marketing workshop that Trustee Lyttle attended.

- C. WCCC/WACCT Meetings October 6th and 7th (Sheridan)
 - 1) WCCC Meeting Updates President Schaffer, Dr. Kari Brown-Herbst

The biggest items to report are their decision to not raise tuition and all 10 academic programs were approved!

2) WACCT Meeting Updates - Trustee Erickson and Trustee Thompson

Trustee Erickson echoed President Schaffer's comment and added that the WCCC has sent some letters to the Governor regarding exception requests to cover fixed cost over the past 10 years and compensation for college employees. The Joint Education Committee (JEC) will be considering two bills, one pertains to the community college investment fund which would provide \$100 million for future investments but the funding source has not been identified, and the other bill pertains to the Wyoming's Tomorrow scholarship. Lastly, the WACCT Board agreed that it would be beneficial for the Gillette College Trustees to become members of WACCT. The Gillette College trustees will be approving this membership at the full membership rate. WACCT will be sponsoring a webinar on October 26th from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. pertaining to how WCCC distributes funds to the colleges. They will also not have a full legislative reception, but they are working on other ideas. They would like to encourage all Trustees to attend the Wyoming Business Alliance Forum November 16-18.

7. BOARD POLICIES
