

This past year:

- 29 of our student athletes made the NJCAA All Academic Teams
- This is based on their GPA for the entire academic year
 - Six had a GPA between 3.6 3.79
 - 10 had a GPA between 3.8-3.99
 - 13 had a perfect 4.0 GPA!



- Head volleyball coach Zach Shaver's team was recognized by the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) for their team GPA of 3.57
- Only 22 of the 100 NJCAA schools received this award!
- Needed at least 3.3 GPA for the year to be considered.







Student Athletes Still Enrolled, Completed, and/or

Transferred to a 4-year School:

Fall 2020 or Spring 2021: 38 student athletes (63%)

Fall 2021 or Spring 2022: 47 student athletes (59%)

Fall 2022 or Spring 2023: 65 student athletes (68%)

Grand total over this time: 150 student athletes (64%)

2019 Cohort of all LCCC students: (57%)

*The coaches & Athletic Department have a <u>significant impact</u> on our student athletes success!



Pillar #2: Competitive Success

Volleyball:

- Won two games at the Region IX tournament
- Head coach didn't start until July









Men's Soccer:

- First year head coach came to within one game of making it to nationals
- Beat Casper 17-16 in a shootout to get to the Region IX Championship game



Women's Soccer:

- Won Region IX & the District tournament
- making it to nationals
- Head coach took over a few days before athletes got to campus









Rodeo:

- Fall- Women won
 Shawn Dubie, men
 placed third
- Took six to CNFR (took five in 2022)





Women's Basketball:

- Made it to the semi-finals of the Region IX tournament
- Had a final record of 23-8
- First ever 20-win season in LCCC history!

Competitive Success Specifics:

A: Roundball teams finishing in the top four Region IX, with the goal of winning the regional championship each year.

- Both men's and women's soccer have been in the Region IX semifinals or better every year since 2020
- Men's basketball has finished in the semifinals the last two years, did not in 2020
- Women's basketball has reached the semifinals the last two years, did not in 2020
- Volleyball made it into the top four of Region IX for the first time since 2019





B: Rodeo teams qualifying for the CNFR, and having individual CNFR qualifiers each year.

- We have not had a full team qualify since the 80's
- Individually, we have had 14 reach the College National Finals since 2020- Five in 2022, six in 2023
- We have had a member in the top ten in the nation two of those years





C: LCCC student athletes successfully moving to next level of competition.

- Men's basketball has had 12 since the spring of 2021
 - Five were from last year alone
- Women's basketball has had nine since the spring of 2021
 - Four were from last year alone
- Men's Soccer has had 16
- Women's Soccer has had 18
- Volleyball has had three; one of which was from last year





C: LCCC student athletes successfully moving to next level of competition (continued).

- Rodeo is a four-year option-most stay here for their degree program.
 - According to our coach, 11 have moved to a four-year school or gone pro
- Esports is too soon to have a number as many of them are still here and competing for multiple leagues while they are here competing for us.
- The NJCAAe and the NCRA are not under the same umbrella as the NJCAA and athletes aren't required to stay amateur while competing for the colleges.





D: Frequent representation at the national tournaments.

Since fall 2020:

Women's Soccer: Two

Men's Soccer: Two

- Rodeo has had a representative in all three years
- Esports has qualified for the postseason in multiple events each year in the spring and fall
 - Two national championships in this time
- Volleyball, Men's Basketball, and Women's Basketball have not made it in that time All three programs were within 1-2 games last year





E: Having LCCC teams nationally ranked each year.

- Men's and Women's Soccer: Every year
- Volleyball: Currently in the rankings- 1st time since 2019
- Women's Basketball: Received votes for the 1st time in school history last year
- Rodeo: Does not do a team ranking system, but points. Our teams have been in the top 20 the past two seasons
- Esports: Does not do a team ranking system
- Men's Basketball: Have not been ranked in this time





F: Demonstrating consistent, high-level competitiveness by being in position to win every game, match, or event, and the progression of athletes over the course of the season.

- Women's Soccer: Started 0-7 last year, made it to the national tourney
- Rodeo: Payton Feyder qualified for the CNFR her first time with a late run in her final three rodeos in the spring of 2022 to qualify
 - Bernard Girard held onto his spot last year by picking up points in the final rodeo at UW
- Men's Soccer: slow start last year & ended up playing for the Region IX title
- Volleyball: Currently in the rankings- 1st time since 2019



A: Teams and athletes actively participating in campus events outside of athletics.

- Women's basketball helping students move-in to the residence halls during the first week of school
- Women's soccer attended a focus group lunch with the Unlocking Opportunity coaches





Campus Relationships

B:Student athlete involvement in campus clubs outside of athletics, aspiring to hold leadership positions within these groups.

- Virtually all of our international student athletes being interested in the revival of our campus International Club
- Representatives from all of our teams applying to become RA's in the dorms
- Would like to work with Campus Life to look for opportunities for student athletes to be involved with other programs on campus





Campus Relationships

C: Proactive outreach on campus by athletics staff, coaches, and teams to promote engagement in Golden Eagle Athletic events.

- Routine Travel Letters sent to faculty regarding student athletes being absent
- Student athletes writing a handwritten note to their instructors inviting them to attend a home contest
- Having a "Staff Appreciation" game each season to invite faculty & their families to join us at a home contest

Community Relationships

B:Proactive outreach to the community by the athletic staff, coaches, and teams to promote engagement in Golden Eagle Athletic events.

- Coaches and student athletes have gone to the community to drop off posters and schedules
- Entire department has gone out to invite community members to events such as our first annual Cornhole tournament in August





Community Relationships

C: Creating opportunities for community members to build relationships with Golden Eagle Athletics' teams, coaches, and athletes.

- Speaking at Kiwanis, Rotary, AARP
- Inviting community groups (Boys & Girls Club, LCSD1 triads) to home contests for free
- Bringing as many student athletes possible to community events so they can interact with everyone involved

- The athletic department going door-to-door to drop off schedules, posters, and invites, to athletic department games and free community events








Strategic Priority #3:

Strengthen LCCC Golden Eagle Athletics through private giving


- With the GEC initiative to be meet the Cheyenne community, comes the ability to build relationships that can help assist us in this

- This allows us to help our programs continue to be more competitive among others within our region



- 3. THEN let's look at adding what would be good for our school, community, and state



Update:
